"Eating to Save Lives: Nutritional Strategies for the New Year" will be the program topic presented by Mendy Cobb, Clinical Dietician, University of Tennessee Medical Center, at the AAUW meeting on Monday, January 27. The meeting will be held at the new Senior Center located just west of the Oak Ridge Civic Center/ Library. There is parking in front of the Senior Center. **Please note that this is a change from our regular meeting place.**

The meeting will begin at 11:30 with lunch of soup, sandwiches, and desserts, catered by the Soup Kitchen. Cost of lunch is \$8.50. Members may add or cancel reservations up to Sunday evening, January 26.
