The Committee is pleased to note that we received a letter from Lt. Gov. Randy McNally that he does not think women should be paid less than men for the same job.

Dear Randy,

I am writing to remind you that this Equal Pay Day when women's salaries catch up to men's salaries. Women have to work 3 months longer to make the same amount for the same job.

On average, over their working life, women make 28% less than men—on average, women lose \$406,000 in wages for the same jobs as men. This, of course, affects the quality of their retirement.

While women are working, of course, also their quality of life is affected by being paid unequal wages. Landlords, insurance companies, the telephone companies, etc. don't give them a 28% discount—so their bills are the same as their male counterparts.
