NCCWSL

The National Conference of College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) is sponsored by AAUW each summer. Local Branches nominate college undergraduate women. Generally, State AAUWs chose attendees and pay for their tuition and lodging while the local Branches and participants handle transportation costs. The event occurs in early June in Washington, DC, or at the University of Maryland Baltimore campus. Last year it was via Zoom. Topics include history, current events, political science, finances, leadership qualities, etc. This Conference had been operating since 2005 with hundreds of women attending annually. Attendee(s) this year will be chosen on December 12, 2021.

AAUW-OAK RIDGE NCCWSL NOMINATION

Maya Weaver, a junior from Knoxville at Tennessee State University, is nominated by AAUW-Oak Ridge to AAUW-TN for the 2022 NCCWSL. Maya is a junior political science major who plans on applying to law school after her graduation in Spring 2023. She has excellent grades and has worked on the League of Women Voters TN Redistricting Project. We thank member Mary Ann Reeves for nominating Maya. We shall learn on December 12 if Maya is selected by AAUW-TN. Should she be selected, we plan to negotiate with her to pay for her transportation. We believe that she should pay a small portion of the cost while we pay the remainder. In that manner, Maya has a vested interest in the event. AAUW-Knoxville has nominated two college women for this event. AAUW-Maryville may have made nomination(s) but we do not know. Lee's Funding Overhaul is a Smokescreen

The Basic Education Program (BEP) in TN has never been fully funded in the 30 years of its existence. It is a formula that distributes state dollars based on the student population of a local school district. Although the 46 component formula along with local economic data determine the amount of state dollars sent to local districts, there has never been enough money allocated for the BEP to move TN out of the bottom five states in the nation for public schools.

Revising the BEP to improve funding can be done, and the BEP has made recommendations for years to do just that. But most of the committee's recommendations have never been implemented because legislature after legislature balked at the price tags of millions of dollars. So the committee quit attaching costs. School systems have filed a lawsuit alleging that TN is not meeting its obligations to adequately fund public schools. That lawsuit includes the BEP Committee's recommendations and is set to go to trial in February 2022.

Governor Lee's and Commissioner of Education Penny Schwinn's efforts to build a new BEP from scratch while involving the public buy-in is an exercise to redistribute the BEP monies. Distribution is not the problem. TN legislators have not yet found the will to do what is ethical for their public Schools, although it has stockpiled record surpluses, a cash reserve of 9 billion dollars.
