Speaker: Michelle Campanis

Michelle graduated from the University of Tennessee with a degree in Agriculture and Natural Resources. She then moved to Boston to work for The Arnold Arboretum of Harvard University in the propagation greenhouses. She received a one-year fellowship from The Garden Club of America to study in England where she spent time at the Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew and studied landscape design at the Chelsea Physic Garden. Upon completion of the fellowship she returned to Massachusetts where she taught horticulture to high school students.

She spent 20 years in Nashville working for Belmont University while raising her daughter and twin sons. She returned to East Tennessee in 2017 to be the education coordinator for the UT Arboretum. This is a full circle journey as her parents
