Importance of Protecting Our Democracy By Supporting Our Journalists In the Free Press

Speaker: Joel Christopher

Joel Christopher is executive director of *Knox News* and the Knoxville News Sentinel. Christopher has worked as a journalist for 27 years as a reporter and editor, including 25 years with the USA Today network. The Knoxville newsroom has been the subject in the past month of two separate national journalism case studies examining its efforts to broaden its coverage to more accurately reflect the community's diversity, including a yearlong collaboration with the University of North Carolina's Hussman School of Journalism and Media. Christopher has worked with The American Press Institute and The Associated Press-NORC Center for Public Affairs Research and best practices for reporting on extremists and their movements, including the newsroom's handling of the case of a Knox County sheriff's lieutenant who publicly called for state prosecution and execution of members of the LGBTQ+ communities.

Christopher and the Knoxville newsroom spearheaded national coverage for the USA TODAY Network of last year's 100th anniversary of ratification of the 19th Amendment. including an augmented-reality video that brought to life historic speeches by three leading suffragists. As the media landscape continues to change, most notably in how people receive and engage with news, Christopher has played an important role in digital initiatives. Knox News experienced doubledigit growth in subscribers in 2021, expanding its footprint as East Tennessee's leading newsroom. Christopher is a native of Wisconsin, graduate of the University of Wisconsin and has worked in and led newsrooms across Wisconsin and in Louisville, Kentucky. He and his wife, Sarah, who is also a journalist, have a 9-year-old son.

EAST TENNESSEE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEES

AAUW LOCAL SCHOLARSHIPS BY THE NUMBERS

Sometimes we need to reflect on what are some of our accomplishments. For such a relatively small, cohesive group as AAUW Oak Ridge, our scholarship-giving has been spectacular. Since 2004, when we decided to fund annually local RSCC Scholarships, my records indicate that we have provided 48 Scholarships and 14 Education Awards. In addition, we have sent 3 college students to the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL). Each one of us should be proud of our efforts leading to these excellent numbers. How special to know that we have encouraged and helped East Tennessee females in the pursuits of their educations and dreams!

As a reminder, the RSCC Scholarships have been given to women 25-years-old and older with at least a 3.0 grade-point average. Family and medical needs also have been taken into consideration. Interestingly, the majority of these scholarships have been awarded to women majoring in Nursing. Over the years the needs of community college women have changed. Tennessee started the HOPE Scholarship Program to encourage high school students to enter community colleges tuition free. Poverty in East Tennessee increased: books and transportation costs skyrocketed. As a result, we have changed our application criteria. Our efforts to keep young women working toward their degrees by paying a portion of their tuition have changed to helping them also with other college expenses, i.e., books, transportation, and child care. Many women are now working in East Tennessee because we have given them a boost toward earning their degrees.

The RSCC Education Awards were given to female students majoring in Education who plan to continue their education at a
